## **Counting Fundraising as Volunteer Service**

Many groups opt to raise funds to better support school needs and expand student opportunities. Fundraising is a significant endeavor. Each process requires a research, planning and organization.

A successful fundraiser requires the commitment of students, parents and staff. Products, pledges and incentives pass through many hands as they are counted, distributed and delivered. Money is exchanged and books must balance.

The following formulas have been developed for all schools and organizations to follow in capturing fundraising efforts and reporting it as volunteer service. The idea is to provide a fair reflection of all volunteer contributions made in support of the fundraiser, from beginning to end. The formulas are based on HOW funds are raised, not on what is sold or for how much.

#### To report fundraising as volunteer service, start by asking two simple questions:

- ① Was the activity a one- or two-part process?
  - 2 How many items were sold or collected?

Point of sale or one-part	Multiply the total number of items sold by 15 minutes (.25).
transaction:	Example: 200 pencils x .25 = 50 hours
(The 'ask' is made and funds/products are exchanged at the same time.)	Example: 1,000 PTA memberships x .25 = 250 hours Example: 1,000 prom tickets x .25 = 250 hours
Two-part transaction:	Multiply the total number of items sold by 30 minutes (.50)
(The 'ask' is made, order is placed and funds/products are exchanged at a later date.)	Example: 500 catalog items x .50 = 250 hours Example: 250 Marathon sponsors x .50 = 125 hours Example: 100 t-shirt preorders x .50 = 50 hours
Monetary Donations Collections / Supplies:	Divide the total of donated items by 10 then multiply by 15 minutes (.25)
(Large sums or multiple items are donated or purchased at a time as a means of fundraising or general contribution.)	Example: $$250$ single donation $\div$ 10 x .25 = 6.25 hours Example: $1,000$ cans $\div$ 10 x .25 = 25 hours Example: $525$ box tops $\div$ 10 x .25 = 13.5 hours Example: $2,000$ school supplies $\div$ 10 x .25 = 50 hours Example: $10,000$ carnival tokens $\div$ 10 x .25 = 250 hours

Fundraiser service time should be itemized by event / activity, not by individual.
