The LRSD is also committed to remaining on solid financial ground. All of our schools are fully accredited according to Arkansas state standards and our teachers are also highly qualified.


We are forming community partnerships in an effort to work collaboratively to accelerate student achievement. With all of us working together, we can positively affect our students' lives.

Diane Barksdale, Principal Carver Magnet School


Diane Barksdale was one of the first four principals in Arkansas to achieve the designation of "master school principal" from the Arkansas Leadership Academy.




Innovative Programs

\$11.2 million in scholarships accepted by seniors in 2007.


Eric Stewart Parkview High School


Out of the 1.2 million high school seniors in 2006 who took the test, only 216 made a perfect score.

Math ITBS Scores




The state benchmark exams are a measure of how LRSD students meet state requirements. The Iowa Test of Basic Skills measures how LRSD students perform compared to students nationwide.



Building for the Future

Construction on the new classroom addition at Forest Heights Middle School began in January 2007.

Students started classes in their new building in December. Other construction projects include a new classroom wing at Wakefield Elementary and a pre-kindergarten addition at Chicot Primary to accommodate the high rate of growth in these neighborhoods.



The Little Rock School
District purchased one of only 19 hybrid electric plug-in buses in the U.S.
